**INTRODUCTION: THE REVIVAL OF P O L S**

The 1985 AGM of the NZPSA has asked the incoming executive of POLS to investigate the possibility of combining the subscription and publications of POLS with that of the journal Political Science. In the interim period, it has been decided that POLS should be revived (after a 12 month absence).

In this edition we have reprinted the 1976 Constitution. There is no mention of amendments to the constitution in the Association's records and the current editors would be pleased to hear from any NZPSA member who is aware of any such amendments - in particular those relating to Clause 5(b) and 5(C).

We have also produced the first instalment of a directory of New Zealand Political Scientists, given notice of forthcoming conferences, reprinted the job descriptions for two vacant Lectureships and listed academics visiting New Zealand.

Clearly, the future success of POLS depends upon the willingness of members to contribute information. The current editors will be only too happy to publish items relating to conferences, visitors, awards, specialist workshops, news, gossip, births, deaths and marriages!!

Lastly, as those who attended the 1985 NZPSA Conference in Auckland will be aware, accurate membership records for 1984-85 are not available. In order to stimulate greater participation, both editions of POLS in 1985 will be sent to all New Zealand Political Scientists, free of charge. However, as of April 1986, membership will require the ANNUAL payment of \$5.00.

**PROPOSED RULES AND CONSTITUTION OF NZPSA  
UNDER THE INCORPORATED SOCIETIES ACT 1908**

Name

1. The name of the society is the *NEW ZEALAND POLITICAL STUDIES ASSOCIATION (INCORPORATED)*.

Objects

2. The objects for which the Association is established are:
  - a) To foster the study and research into political phenomena, especially those of particular interest to New Zealand.
  - b) To provide a forum in New Zealand for the discussion of political phenomena among interested persons, irrespective of occupation, party affiliation, or political opinion.
  - c) To disseminate information on political phenomena.
  - d) In furtherance of the objects of the Association,
    1. To produce a newsletter;
    2. To hold public meetings, lectures, conferences, summer and winter schools, study groups, and discussion groups;
    3. To collect, preserve, publish, and distribute books, newspapers, journals, periodicals, magazines, documents, manuscripts, and correspondence;
    4. To assist with funds or otherwise any book, journal or other publication dealing with political phenomena;
    5. To develop a political internship programme;
    6. To facilitate faculty exchanges;
    7. To develop a research institute for the study of political, economic, and social questions of special interest to New Zealand;
    8. To cooperate, and where appropriate, to affiliate with any other association, institute or society having similar objects.

Membership

3.
  - a) Membership of the Association shall be open to all persons who accept the objects of the Association.
  - b) No rights of membership shall belong to any member whose subscription is six months or more in arrears.
  - c) Any member wishing to terminate his membership shall pay all arrears of subscription, if any, and shall forward his resignation in writing to the National Office.



#### Affiliation Fees

4. The annual membership fee shall be determined from time to time by the Executive of the Association. Only financial members shall have the right to vote for officers of the Association and to hold office. Payment of the membership fee shall entitle a member to receive the Newsletter and other publications designated by the Executive for general distribution to members.

#### Officers

5. a) The Association shall elect an Executive consisting of:
  - a President, an Executive Secretary, a Treasurer, an Editor of Publications, and such Area Coordinators as may from time to time be established by the Executive of the Association. The Executive shall have the power to conduct the business of the Association between general meetings, and to fill any extraordinary vacancies that may occur.
  - i) The President - At all meetings of the Association and of the Executive, the President shall be Chairperson, and in his/her absence, the Secretary, or if both are absent, then a Chairperson shall be elected from those present. The President shall present the Annual or Biennial Report to the Association's general meeting.
  - ii) The Executive Secretary - The Executive Secretary shall attend and shall keep minutes of all general meetings of the Executive, and forward copies of the same to all members; shall call all general meetings and meetings of the Executive; and shall carry out such other duties as the general meeting or the Executive shall require.
  - iii) The Treasurer - The Treasurer shall attend all general meetings and meetings of the Executive and shall receive all moneys due to the Association and disburse under authority of the general meeting or the Executive all moneys payable by the Association; shall keep proper books of account, prepare financial statements as are required, prepare an annual balance sheet, and shall produce all such account books as are required by the general meeting or the Executive; and shall carry out such other duties as the general meeting or the Executive shall require.
  - iv) The Editor of Publications - The Editor of Publications shall attend all general meetings and meetings of the Executive and shall be responsible for producing a newsletter; shall develop a plan for establishing an official journal of the Association; shall make recommendations to the Executive or to the general meeting regarding the collection, preservation, publication and distribution of books, newspapers, journals, periodicals, magazines, documents, manuscripts and correspondence; and shall carry out such other duties as the general meeting or the Executive shall require.

- v) The Area Coordinators - The Area Coordinators shall be responsible for developing membership in their geographic areas, for calling such meetings in their areas as seem necessary, and for looking after local arrangements for general meetings to be held in their areas. Each area's coordinators may only be nominated and elected by members residing within that particular area.
- b) Elections shall proceed by ballot prior to the general meeting. The Secretary shall circularise members informing them of the date nominations will close. The Secretary shall circulate the ballot paper with any relevant information supplied by the nominee to members at least twenty-eight (28) days prior to the general meeting and the results will be announced at the general meeting.
- c) All officers will be elected for a two year term, renewable for only one more term.
- d) In the case of positions which are not filled by the above procedure, nominations will be called for and the elections take place at the general meeting.
- e) For both forms of elections specified above, the Secretary in consultation with one other member of the Executive shall appoint at least two scrutineers to supervise the counting of votes. Election shall be by simple majority.

#### Meetings

- 6. A general meeting of the Association shall be held at least every two years. The time and place of the general meeting shall be determined by the previous general meeting which may, however, remit the final decision to the Executive. Special general meetings may be called by the Executive at the request in writing of ten members of the Association. The quorum at general meetings shall be fifteen members.
- 7. At least twenty-eight (28) days' notice must be given for the holding of a general meeting. The general meeting shall have power to consider proposed constitutional amendments and may vote on such amendments, but if such amendments are passed, they must subsequently be circulated to all members within twenty eight (28) days, for final decision by postal ballot by majority of those voting. All other decisions taken at general meetings shall be by a simple majority of those present, and voting shall be by a show of hands unless a secret ballot is called for.

#### General Provisions as to Government

- 8. The Executive shall, subject to any express direction of the general meeting, have the entire management of the Association and the income and property thereof, and may do all acts, matters, and things to further the aims of the Association.

### Common Seal

9. a) The Executive shall provide and be responsible for the custody of a Common Seal of the Association.
- b) Whenever the Common Seal of the Association requires to be impressed upon any instrument the same shall be affixed pursuant to a resolution of the Association or of the Executive and in the presence of and shall be attested to by not less than three members of the Executive, one of whom shall be the President, the Secretary or the Treasurer.

### Sections

10. a) With the approval of the Executive, any group of at least ten members of the Association, sharing a common interest in a particular field of politics (broadly defined), may constitute themselves into a specialised Section of the Association. Any Section shall have power to appoint a Committee.
- b) The Executive shall have the power to approve the constitution and the activities of a Section, to recognise it as such and to withdraw such recognition.
- c) A Section may, with the approval of the Executive, charge its members such fees as may be necessary to cover its expenses.
- d) A Section may organise its own conference, or make a separate contribution to the conference of the Association.
- e) Sections are not entitled to speak in the name of the Association.

### Control and Investment of Funds

11. The Executive shall have power to manage the funds of the Association and to make rules concerning the management of such funds, provided that cheques and other documents must be signed by the Treasurer and at least one other member of the Executive. Income and property of the Association however defined shall be applied solely towards the promotion of the objects and purposes of the Association, and no portion thereof shall be paid or transferred directly or indirectly by dividend, bonus, or otherwise to any member of the Association.

### Registered Office

12. The address of the Registered Office of the Association and notice of every change of situation of the registered office shall be sent to every member and to the Registrar in accordance with the Incorporated Societies Act, 1908.

### Winding Up

13. In the event of the winding up of the Association, any assets remaining after the discharge of all liabilities shall be used for educational purposes as may be decided by the Public Trustee.

**NEW ZEALAND POLITICAL STUDIES ASSOCIATION**

The Seventh General Meeting of the New Zealand Political Studies Association was held on Wednesday 22 May 1985 at 4.15 in Arts 1716, University of Auckland.

APOLOGIES: Dr John Morrow and Professor R.M. Chapman

MINUTES OF THE SIXTH GENERAL MEETING: The Minutes of the previous Annual General Meeting had not yet been received by the incoming Executive Secretary.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

Dr E.P. Aimer gave an account of some of the difficulties of transition in control of the Association to the incoming officeholders.

TREASURER'S REPORT:

Mr Raymond Miller reported recent receipt of the accumulated funds of the Association from the outgoing Treasurer. \$1500 had been lodged in an interest-bearing account at the Bank of New Zealand. No financial statement had as yet been received from the outgoing Treasurer. Mr Miller also gave a preliminary report on funding of the 1985 Conference.

EIGHTH NZPSA CONFERENCE:

Dr Jonathan Boston and Dr Martin Holland offered on behalf of the Department of Political Science at the University of Canterbury to organise the 1986 Conference. It was moved (Dr H. Gold/Professor John Roberts) that the 1986 NZPSA Conference be held at the University of Canterbury. CARRIED unanimously.

GENERAL BUSINESS:

The meeting discussed a proposal from one of the editors of Political Science, Dr John Morrow, that the NZPSA establish a combined subscription with Political Science. The proposal was tabled and examined at length. It was moved (Professor J.R. Flynn/J. Atkinson) that the NZPSA empower its executive to negotiate a combined subscription arrangement with the editorial board of Political Science for consideration at the next Annual General Meeting. CARRIED unanimously

There was discussion of the difficulties in transition of officeholders experienced and a review of the procedures for the election of the Association's Officers. It was eventually agreed that no changes to the NZPSA constitution were necessary but that it was desirable for new officeholders to be confirmed somewhat earlier than had been the case recently. It was moved (Flynn/Dr Andrew Sharp) that the present Executive move as expeditiously as possible to the election of officers. CARRIED

GENERAL BUSINESS (CONTINUED)

Discussion on the timing of NZPSA Conferences produced broad agreement that they should be held annually, and it would be desirable for their location to be planned well in advance. It was moved (Gold/Dr Ray Goldstein) that the incoming Executive consider the possibility of planning for an Annual Conference each May, and bring down proposals for the next Conference. CARRIED

Finally, it was moved (Dr Alan Simpson/Gold) that the NZPSA notes with concern the absence of a Political Science Department at Massey and that proposals be prepared for the next Conference with a view to forwarding them to the University Grants Committee and the Massey University Council. CARRIED

**FIFTH INTER-UNIVERSITY CONFERENCE OF TEACHERS OF POLITICAL SCIENCE**

**MAY 1985**

The formal meeting of the inter-university conference of teachers of Political Studies was held on Wednesday 22 May. Throughout the discussions of those matters recommended for discussion by the Vice-Chancellor's Committee a general theme emerged: a lack of resources available for the optimal performance of both teaching and research. Higher staffing ratios than found in other parts of the universities meant too much time spent on teaching and not enough on research; inadequate library funding and the increasing cost of books and journals meant difficulties for both teachers and students in gaining access to essential reading; and the limited financial resources available to support research in Political Studies lead to further constraints in that area.

TEACHING: Heads of their departments or their representatives gave brief presentations on course structures, curriculum development, and staffing changes. During subsequent discussion it was agreed that each department is obliged to present a basic menu of courses introducing students to various aspects of the discipline. Areas of specialisation tend to reflect the interests of staff members and are therefore subject to change. It was noted that Otago in particular teaches Latin American politics; Canterbury has strength in Middle East studies, and Auckland and Victoria both have Asian Politics streams. Auckland department representatives also reported strong student interest in Pacific Politics, which the department is unable so far to fully meet. Over the years particular departments have developed areas of obvious potential strength: Victoria University takes advantage of its proximity to government; the University of Auckland department has developed media studies as a major area of specialisation; and the University of Otago puts perhaps the strongest emphasis on the teaching of political theory. At the meeting it was agreed that students particularly at the postgraduate level should be encouraged to relocate where another department could offer them more; most of those present could see little difficulty in this. Examining and assessing were discussed, and

it was agreed that generally existing arrangements, particularly in the case of assessing, were satisfactory. More specific discussions involved departments' policies with respect to teaching students methodological and research skills. It was noted that unless such courses were compulsory they tended to have quite low enrolments. The teaching of New Zealand politics was also discussed, and it was noted that all departments with the exception of Auckland teach it at the first-year level.

RESEARCH. The meeting briefly discussed encouragement of more research by postgraduate students. A number of departments expressed concern at inadequate provision for nonacademic staff for research assistance. It was noted that the Auckland department has built up over the years considerable resources for media-based research: in particular its Audio-Visual Archive, which holds material some of which is found nowhere else, and is the focus of increasing attention from interested parties both in and outside the university community. Providing a very extensive data-base for communications research, the Archive is still partly funded out of money officially allocated for part-time teaching, and would benefit greatly from better staffing so that its resources could be made more widely available.

As funding for research within New Zealand is so limited, it was suggested that it might be desirable to improve access to data bases overseas. In particular, the university libraries could be prevailed upon to subscribe to the University of Michigan Consortium which provides access to extensive data at a cost of US\$4000 annually. It was decided that a proposal be circulated to each department for wider discussion before further action was determined.

A separate meeting of researchers into New Zealand electoral studies discussed the possibility of a national political survey timed for the next general election and once again lack of research support was a major theme. Various alternative options were discussed and further inquiry agreed upon.

CONCLUSION. The conference made no specific recommendations to the Vice-Chancellor's Committee. It was generally agreed that the discussions had been extremely useful, and that individuals and departments would pursue action in a number of areas through the appropriate channels. Appreciation was expressed for the opportunity to meet every three years under the sponsorship of the Vice-Chancellor's Committee.

### Politics and the Life Sciences

The Association for Politics and the Life Sciences, an international professional society, was founded in 1980 to advance interest in and encourage scholarship about biopolitics, and it represents a serious and continuing commitment to a life science orientation within political science.

The founding of the Association is an outgrowth of the rapid and spectacular development of new knowledge in the life sciences. Almost as quickly as it has been produced, this knowledge has had theoretical and public policy influence-raising serious political, philosophical, legal, and social questions.

The semi-annual journal of the Association, Politics and the Life Sciences, reflects this deepening interest of political scientists in both the methods and the findings of research in the life sciences. It publishes refereed articles, as well as review essays, research notes, news of conference activities, and information regarding curricular developments.

Specific topics covered in the journal include the relationship of ethology and sociobiology to politics and ethics; the influence of physiology, age, gender, etc. on political behavior; and policy-related topics on biomedical technologies, health, food, population, etc.
